
***Thinking in Pictures*




***Glass Houses* by Louise Penny**

***Mr. Dickens and his Carol* by Samantha Silva**



***The Woman in Cabin 10* by Ruth Ware**



***Becoming Bonnie* by Jenni Walsh**


Becoming Bonnie is the untold story of how wholesome Bonnelyn Parker became half of the infamous Bonnie and Clyde duo!
